Fight on Polio Resumed With Clinics at Schools; Salk Vaccine Still Free

The Floyd County Health Department has resumed a schedule of polio clinics in an effort to give mmunization to as many persons under age 20 and as many pregnant mothers as will accept the free services, it was announced this week by M. V. Clark, de-

partment administrator. The polio season, it was noted, is not far distant, and only a fraction of the county's population has been immunized against

the disease First of the clinics already have een held, but prevalence of inluenza and a virus cut down on attendance at these. These schools vill later be visited again.

The Left Beaver section of the county in particular has had a near-epidemic of flu this month. Dr. Russell Hall, of Wheelwright, was quoted as estimating there were 300 flu and virus cases in Wheelwright and Weeksbury this week. The Garrett section of Right Beaver Creek and scattered ommunities over the county have

been hard-hit. Mr. Clark says an ample supply of Salk vaccine is on hand to meet all demands at the series of clinics now under way but that after June 30 no free vaccine will be available. The federal appropriation, which made free vaccine covers the period ending on that date, and is for the immunization of persons 20 years of age and under, it was explained.

The Salk vaccine last year was 80 per cent effective. To emphasize the importance of





Merit System For Engineers Held Important

Frankfort, March 25 (Spl.) - The proposal to put state highway engineers under a merit system has been called "one of the most forward steps the Department of Highways has taken since its inception.

The speaker was Highway Commissioner Robert Humphreys. He told the Kentucky Highway Conference at the University of Kentucky, Lexington, that he wanted the engineers to stay out of politics and do the engineering.

Dean D. V. Terrell of the university college said the merit system "should have a far reaching influence on young people thinking about coming into the highway depart-

Gov. A. B. Chandler has said he will prepare an order to bring under the merit system all graduate or licensed engineering personnel of the road agency.

Humphreys expressed confidence the state's 100 million dollar road bond issue would be declared valid by the courts in a test suit and said the Commonwealth's vast road program would depend more upon engineering than financing.

Lt. Gov. Harry Lee Waterfield said "there's not going to be any trouble selling the bonds." He declared he was confident the state would get the highest available rating in the bond sale, because Kentucky has no general bonded indebtedness, though there is some revenue bond debt.





Voluntary Slum Beautification Program

Philadelphia's transformation began on seven blocks of North Beechwood Street in 1953 when residents planted flowers and shrubs donated by cooperating graden clubs. The next year 2,000 window boxes were installed on

34 "garden blocks." By 1956, there were 93 blocks in the program, with each block having its own garden club or committee and striving to outdo the neighboring blocks in imaginative planting. In that year Mrs. Bush-Brown re Philadelphia's Gimbel ceived Award "for outstanding contribution to humanity.

Beauty breeds beauty-and goodness," she says. Just as the first flowers prompted the people clear the littered streets, so the new spirit moved into their homes and their lives. The colorful window box inspires neat curtains. Curtains emphasize the drabness of a room that needs brightening-and the room gets

"You have to go inside these homes to realize how far-reaching this idea is," a social worker told the writer.

For many disabled people, failure to file an application with their social security district offices before the end of June will mean the loss of all their social security disability protection, and for some it will also mean the loss of their rights to any old-age and survivors insurance benefits for themselves and their families in the future. Should a disabled worker die without having filed an application to protect his social security disability rights, the survivors benefits pay able to his family under the social security law may be greatly reduced.

The Bureau says that an estimated 700,000 severely disabled men and women in the country have worked long enough under social security to be eligible to have their social security records frozen under a 1954 provision in the law. When a disabled worker's record is frozen, the years when his disability keeps him from working are not counted against him in figuring the social benefits due him in the future or payable to his family in case of his death. Of the 700,000, about 400,000 people-those between 50 and 65 years of age-are eligible for monthly disability insurance benefits beginning with July.

Annual grasses and weeds in strawberry patches can be controlled by certain herbicides and careful attention to proved meth-

James Herron, University Agricultural Experiment Station weed specialist, says Crag Herbicide, ed as a spray (3 pounds wetfor actual area treated) is recommended for 1957. The first application can be made 10 to 14 days after setting first-year plants. Old patches can be treated immediately after harvest, when rows have been narrowed and the patches rejuvenated. The same rates apply



Such biological control may be as simple as placing goldfish in a pool to eat mosquito larvae or as complex as the program planned to eliminate the screwworm fly, which has wiped out whole herds of livestock in the Southeast. In this case, the male screwworm is sterilized by atomic radiation and. as the female mates but once, release of the sterilized male in millions, whittles down the pest

Tests have proven value of biological control in fighting the codling moth in apple orchards, pine sawfly in Canadian forests (a pest which six years ago was killing seven times as much timber as fire), corn earworms and alfalfa caterpillars. Tests on the pink bollworm, unstoppable cotton pest, also hold promise.

Insects have built up such a resistance to chemicals that today's housefly can tolerate a dose of DDT, 1,000 times as great as that of his ancestors of 10 years ago. This has led to use of poisons in such frightening amounts that three federal agencies are now preparing controls to protect con-

Thus, the establishment of some 90 foreign parasites and predators whittling away at our insect pests holds hope for less dangerous, more effective and less costly pest






